NEWS FROM JIM, SUE AND MATTHEW HOLMES 33 Caledonian Way, Darlington, DL1 3RJ, England

Many friends will know that 2007 has been a year of considerable challenge; we began on a note of joy—the conception of Rebecca, and a sense that nothing is too hard for the Lord (Genesis 18:14). For some time, we had been wondering about, and praying about, the possibility of a sibling for Matthew, and the answer came in the form of confirmation from our local medical practice: 'Yes, Mrs Holmes, I can confirm that the test has come back positive; congratulations!'

The excitement was, of course, tempered with a measure of apprehension; nobody takes the success of a pregnancy for granted, and it is our view that God had different purposes in mind as he worked the situation out for his glory and for our good.

News of the problems came in an incremental and cumulative manner; a cystic hygroma was observed at the twelve-week scan. This subsequently resolved, but then a heart defect became apparent, one of a severe magnitude. Tests eventually confirmed Down's Syndrome, and Rebecca ultimately developed hydrops—a condition whereby her body cavities filled with fluid which her heart was unable to cope with. The rather clinical sounding term—foetal death—meant that we had a stillbirth situation, just around the time Matthew was to start 'big' school. The delivery was fraught with complications, and Sue ended up having to have an emergency Caesarean section, having lost copious quantities of blood after attempting natural birth. Rebecca was buried in Darlington.

Of course, we must hasten to add that 2007 has had many positive aspects to it. On January 3rd, we celebrated twenty years of marriage. It seems just such a short time ago that we were covenanting together in holy matrimony in South Africa.



MUG-SHOTS ON THE MUG?

I have a large ornamental coffee mug with portraits of 42 presidents of the USA. I was looking at it earlier this evening and I was struck that in my lifetime, there have been eight presidencies. It's not that I am particularly old; it's that time goes by quickly. In fact, when I saw my age on a medical form the other day, I found myself somewhat taken aback; am I really 47? It was a powerful reminder to consider again the words of Moses in Psalm 90:12: 'So teach us to number our days, That we may present to You a heart of wisdom.'

REALITY CHECK

We want Matthew to grow into a man of strong character and grace. We endeavour to teach him the gospel, and he has begun to understand many of the concepts in the Bible. Over a meal the other day, I asked him this: 'Matthew, how can a person live for ever?' I was hopeful of the right theological answer, but he retorted immediately, 'By keeping healthy.'

I had anticipated a far more theologically apt answer. After all, doesn't he get daily Bible instruction? Don't we enact the story of Jonah in the bath and talk about repentance? When a young man once asked Jesus a similar question—'Good Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?' (Mark 10:17), he was pointed back to God's holy law, the Ten Commandments. This was not so much to make him keep them, and somehow earn his salvation, as it was to make him see his need of a Saviour who had kept the law perfectly.

At this time of the year, we do well to think again of the active obedience of Jesus Christ to all of God's law. Not only did he die as a Substitute in the place of ordinary people like us, but he lived a life pleasing to God in order that his obedience may be imputed to all who trust him as the Christ—Prophet to teach us, Priest to intercede for us and bless us, and King to rule over us and defend us from our enemies.
